

## **CURVE-BILLED THRASHER**



Curve-billed Thrasher (Toxostoma curvirostre)

- Curve-billed Thrasher, a large brown songbird with yellow eyes, is one of four thrasher species living in the Sonoran Desert. Three key facts about Curve-billed Thrashers:
  - 1. Each spring, they make bowl-shaped nests of twigs in cholla cacti or dense shrubs, laying 3-4 blue-brown speckled eggs.
  - 2. Their call is one of the characteristic sounds of the Sonoran Desert, a loud "whit-wheet," in addition to a melodic song.
  - 3. They use their black scythe-shaped beak to sift through leaves and debris on the ground to look for insects and seeds.
