

COULTER'S LUPINE



Coulter's or sparse-flowered lupine (*Lupinus sparsiflorus*)
This month we are learning about Coulter's lupine as we enter the spring wildflower season. Here are some key facts:

- Palmate basal leaves are divided into five leaflets, giving it the appearance
 of a hand with fingers spread and facing the sun during the day but folding
 up at night, giving it the name of "sun watcher" by the Tohono O'Odham
 people.
- Most have a spike of deep blue-purple flowers with a yellow throat, although some may have white flowers.
- Lupines are in the pea or legume family, but this species has toxic seeds.
