<b>TOPIC: Environmental</b>		<b>Responses</b>
1	The golf course should not be built. It will be disturbing and erasing significant cultural and historical artifacts that are directly in the development site	We don't know the status until surveys/evaluations are completed - Federal/state law dictates level compliance and determined by the level of significance of findings - antinquiries
2	Ecological impacts of rerouting trails and using the current parks space.	Research/survey - mitigation options - add master plan 10% comparison - nature based solutions
<b>TOPIC: General</b>		<b>Responses</b>
1	No Maricopa County Funding	There will be no direct Maricopa County funding - agreement as written will increase revenue/operating funds for the parks department. Junior National is responsible for all permits/surveys
<b>TOPIC: Trails</b>		<b>Responses</b>
1	Water run off so trails once changed are not washed away in heavy monsoon rains.	Parks will address using Parks Trails Standards so that it should not wash the trails out - build to standards - reroutes may improve drainage on Baseline Trail.
<b>TOPIC: Water</b>		<b>Responses</b>
1	Where will the water be coming from?	Maricopa County Parks currently has the water rights and Junior National may purchase additional water rights from other sources. The current water supply comes from a Parks well on-site. Per the Arizona Department of Water Resources, Junior National will be required to submit a Water Conservation Plan to address the water use. As we understand it, the plan is not to have more than 70 acres of overseeded turf and cannot use more than 422 acre feet of water. There will be no water provided by Central Arizona Project. Additionally, the Park has reduced turf acres from 60 to 10 of needed irrigation.
