Lake Pleasant now offers a variety of hiking pleasures.

Enjoy the scenic beauty of Lake Pleasant from the top of Yavapai Point, by hiking the new **Yavapai Point Trail**.

The **Cottonwood Trail** is a scenic, easy trail connecting from the north entrance station to the Pipeline Canyon Trail.

The **Pipeline Canyon Trail** crosses the lake at Pipeline Cove; the crossing may be closed at high water levels.

All mileages listed are one-way. For more trail information, see park staff.

Trails are open the same times as park hours.

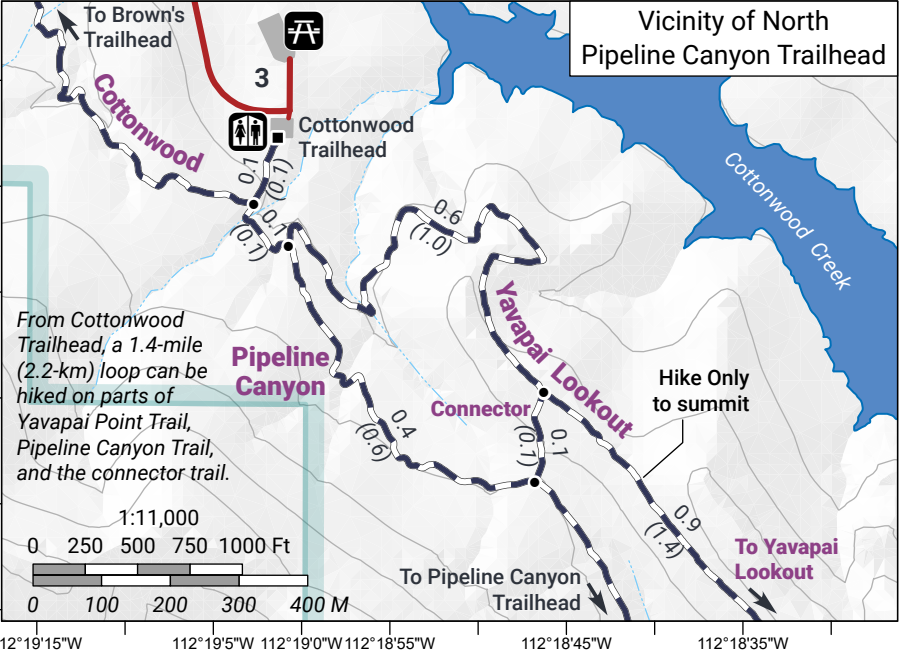

If you are in the mood to try to see some wild burros, you won't want to miss the **Wild Burro Trail**.

The **Beardsley Trail** is the longest trail in the park's system at 4.4 miles.

The **Frog Tanks Trail** accesses the Beardsley Trail from a parking area near the 10-Lane Boat Ramp.

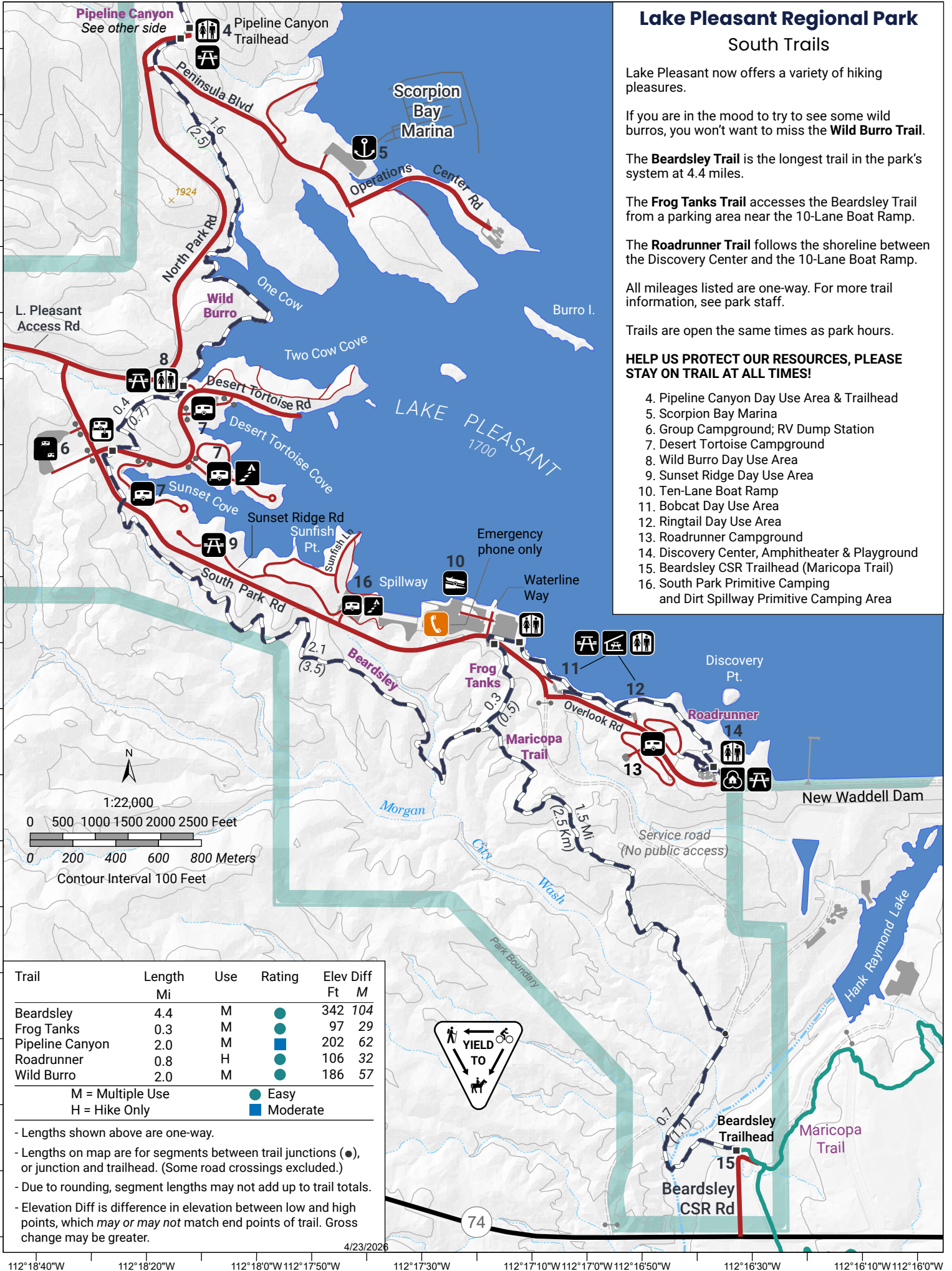
The **Roadrunner Trail** follows the shoreline between the Discovery Center and the 10-Lane Boat Ramp.
